

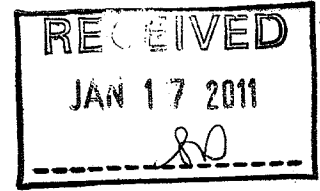



Subject: 4th Quarter Crime Statistics

Recommendation: Receive and File for Information

Background:

Total Crimes:

During the 2010 fourth quarter there were 1558 actual "crimes" reported, this is a 20% decrease compared to the 1864 reported during the fourth quarter of 2009. The clearance rate is 54% compared to 53% in 2009.

Homicides:

There were no homicides reported in the third quarter of 2010, which is consistent with none being reported within the same time frame in 2009.

Robberies:

There were 6 robberies reported in the fourth quarter of 2010, with 8 being reported during this time period in 2009. Of the 6 reported in 2010, four resulted in charges being laid.

Of the 6 Actual robberies reported in the fourth quarter of 2010, 1 robbery involved the threat of violence and 5 robberies involved actual violence/assaults. Two of the incidents involved a knife and one involved Bear Spray as the weapon of choice. The remaining involved physical force being used.

Two of the robberies were as a result of a 'home invasion' with one resulting in serious bodily harm.

Break and Enters:

During the fourth quarter of 2010 there were 139 Break and Enters reported of which 16 were unfounded. The clearance rate was 16%. This is compared to 133 reported Break and Enters reported in the fourth quarter of 2009, with 13 unfounded and an 11% clearance rate.

Motor Vehicle Thefts:

There were 31 reported thefts of motor vehicles with a clearance rate of 21% during the 4th quarter of 2010. Of these 7 were determined to be unfounded. In the fourth quarter of 2009, 62 vehicles were reported stolen and of these 8 were determined to be unfounded. The clearance rate was lower in 2009 at 9%.

Assaults:

There were 119 assaults reported in the fourth quarter of 2010, compared to 183 in 2009, a decrease of 35%. Of the 119 reported assaults 18 were deemed as unfounded. The clearance rate for 2010 is 80% which is a decrease from 88% in 2009. Assaults (level 1) accounted for 81 of these incidents and Assault Causing Bodily Harm or with a Weapon accounted for 13 of these. Of these assault types 23 were associated to a Domestic related incident.

Of the 23 spousal related assaults 1 incident reported involving Bodily Harm inflicted on the victim.

Sex Offences:

There were 43 sexual assaults (4 unfounded) reported during the 4th quarter 2010 with a clearance rate of 69%. In addition there were 4 other sexual offences* reported within this time frame with a 100% clearance rate.

This compares to 31 with (3 unfounded) sexual assaults reported during the same time period in 2009 with a 100% clearance rate. In addition there were 4 other sexual offences* reported within this time frame with a 100% clearance rate.

*Sexual Interference, Sexual Exploitation, and Invitation to Sexual Touching

Frauds:

There were 80 frauds (5 unfounded) reported during the fourth quarter of 2010 with a 37% clearance rate compared to 98 (6 unfounded) incidents reported in 2009 with a 59% clearance rate.

Drug Offences:

There were 60 drug related offences, with a 56% clearance rate, reported in this quarter compared to 55 with a 91% clearance rate during the same time frame in 2009. Of the 60 reported drug related offences reported 34 of these involved Cannabis, 17 were related to Other Controlled Substances and 5 involved Cocaine.

ViCLAS:

There were 26 ViCLAS criteria offences identified during the fourth quarter of 2010. Of the 26 identified criteria offences, 3 were deemed to be Unfounded within 30 days and 1 is still outstanding. The complainant would not disclose on one incident.

Criminal Harassment:

There were 57 incidents of criminal harassment reported with 8 being deemed Unfounded in the fourth quarter of 2010 compared to 56 being reported in the same time period in 2009 with 10 being deemed as Unfounded.

In 2010, of the 57 incidents of harassment 19 were domestic related while in 2009 criminal harassment was associated to 20 Domestic related incidents.

Utter Threats:

There were 47 incidents of threats reported with a clearance rate of 85% during the fourth quarter of 2010. This is a decrease of 24 incidents compared to the 71 incidents with a clearance rate of 71% in the third quarter of 2009.



Background:

FALSE ALARMS

There were a total of 373 alarms in the 4th quarter of 2010. Of the 377 alarms 0 were unfounded leaving an actual total 373 alarms. The breakdown of the alarms is as follows:

DOMESTIC DISTURBANCES

A total of 119 domestic disturbances were reported in the 4th quarter of 2010 compared to 82 in the same time frame for 2009. There were a total of 2 unfounded domestic disturbances resulting in an actual total of 117. This is an increase of 30% from last year within this same time frame.

These 117 domestic disturbances are situations where two people are presently or in the past have been involved in an intimate relationship and are involved in a dispute however there is no physical force or violence involved.

Once the investigation reveals there was an assault, threats, harassment, mischief to property, etc...the call type would be changed from domestic disturbance to reflect the more serious allegation.

TROUBLE WITH YOUTH

Calls involving trouble with youth have increased by 4%, from 77 occurrences in 2010 compared to 74 occurrences in 2009.

MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISIONS

There were 447 motor vehicle collisions during the 4th quarter of 2010, an increase of 8.5% of the 409 reported during the same time period of 2009. There were 29 personal injury collisions reported in the 4th quarter of 2010, which is an increase of 41% to the 17 reported in the 4th quarter of 2009. There were 3 fatalities in the 4th quarter of 2010 and 0 for the same time period of 2009.

TRAFFIC COMPLAINTS

There were a total of 489 traffic complaints during the 4th quarter of 2010, a decrease of 9% compared to the 531 traffic complaints in 2009. Of the 489 traffic complaints there were:

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT UNIT

The Traffic Management Unit laid 487 Provincial Statutes charges which include: Highway Traffic Act, Liquor Licence Act, Trespass to Property and Safe Streets Act. There were 7 Criminal Code Charges and 4 Controlled Drugs and Substances Act Charges laid during this time frame. There were 208 Calls for Service with 184 Reports being submitted.

Level 2 Collision Investigators Course

Cst. Travers attended a Level 2 Collision Course in October. The course was an in-depth course focusing on the basics of collision reconstruction and is an intensive 1 week commitment. Sgt. Sweet attended as an instructor during the course presenting on numerous subjects including expert witness testimony, speed calculations and search warrants. BPS now is able to offer training in the Level 2 course.

Public Service Announcements Distracted Driving

Cst. Stitt attended at both radio stations to do a voice byte for motorist safety to promote the TMU's enhanced initiative to distracted driving. This is part of an education program to ensure safety of all motorists in an attempt to reduce collisions. Increased enforcement was conducted during the months of October, November and December focusing on heavy traffic areas with an emphasis on zero tolerance. A total of 67 charges for driving with cell phones were issued. Cst. Stitt was a guest on the Lorne Brooker morning show talking about distracted driving and impaired driving.

Enhanced R.I.D.E. Program

During the month of December officers conducted a primary enforcement initiative focusing on ride. Officers from BPS conducted RIDE during the holiday season supplemented by Uniformed Members. BPS officers set up on multiple nights with other Police agencies with the Quinte Region Traffic Coalition to conduct check in high volume locations. A total of 5882 vehicles were checked, with 28 persons providing roadside samples. 9 persons were issued 3 day licence suspensions with 2 drivers issued 7 day suspensions. A total of 5 charges were laid during the campaign.

Traffic Stops leading to Drug Arrests

On three separate incidents in October vehicles were stopped for cell phone use and two speeding infractions. Due to the observations and diligent work of the officers involved, a total of 536 grams of marijuana was seized, with 3 charges laid under the Controlled Drug and Substance Abuse Act and 1 Charge under the Criminal Code.

Fatal Collisions: Officers are currently investigating 3 motor vehicle collisions that resulted in a fatality.

On the 12th of November 2010 at approximately 5:01 a.m. the collision occurred on Harmony Road.
On the 18th of November at approximately 3:33 p.m. the collision occurred on Dundas Street West.
On the 31st of December 2010 at approximately 2:01 a.m. a motor vehicle collision occurred between a pedestrian and vehicle on Station Street.

CANINE

Cst. Joly conducted 7 tracks, which included 5 callouts, directly assisted uniform Operations with 1 arrest, and he assisted with 2 CDSA Warrants. The Canine Unit also participated in 1 demonstration at Moira Secondary School. In the 4th quarter of 2010 the Canine Unit dealt with 35 occurrences. During this time, Cst. Joly was assigned to the Criminal Investigation Branch. He laid 25 Criminal charges.

COMMUNITY RESPONSE

The Community Response had 40 calls for service and were dispatched to 37. 3 Criminal charges were laid under the Youth Criminal Justice Act Diversion.

School Liaison Officer/Community Resource Officer

Cst. Orr responded to 37 occurrences and 32 reportable incidents; laying 3 criminal charges under the Youth Criminal Justice Act relating to these specific calls within the school systems. Cst Orr responded to calls for service in both the elementary and secondary schools during the quarterly period. 9 youths were dealt with under the Diversion Program and other means informally within the Education Act.

Meetings Attended

Cst. Orr attended Safe Schools Meeting with the Hastings and Prince Edward School Board. She also attended the Community Threat Assessment Protocol meetings at Centennial and Parkdale Public Schools with an emphasis on implementing the standardized program throughout all the schools. Cst. Orr is an active board member with the Quinte Children's Foundation. Cst. Bongard attended several meetings regarding his role as co-ordinator of the Crime Stoppers Program and also attended a board meeting for Children's Safety Village.

Assistance to Schools

Cst. Orr instructed 43 classes in the grade three programs (driving/road safety) from Hastings and Prince Edward School Board, Algonquin and Lakeshore School Board, and Mohawk Schools within the Children's Safety Village.

Cst. Orr attended Queen Elizabeth Public School in dealing with bullying issues and has begun implementing the anti-bullying program in the Elementary School Programs with assistance from the Hastings/Prince Edward Health Unit.

Other Assignments

The Safety Village/ School Response Unit currently had two co-op students from St. Theresa's and Centennial Secondary Schools. Both students assisted Cst. Orr at the Village with the presentation of the elementary school program. Cst. Orr directly supervises these students while here as part of their co-op program. During the month of November, a third student from Grade 12 in Kingston was also assisting Cst. Orr.

Cst. Bongard monitored the Community Policing Volunteers and assisted in the annual general meeting and elections of volunteers. Cst. Bongard monitored bi-weekly volunteer Criminal Record Checks assisted by members of the Community Policing Volunteers and Auxiliary Officers that are held at the Children's Safety Village.

Cst. Bongard, along with and Community Policing Volunteers, hosted a Halloween party at the village. The event was highly successful with an excess of 100 visitors. Cst. Bongard operated the Halloween Safe Streets Program utilizing numerous students from area high schools and Loyalist College. He assisted the volunteers with the required criminal record checks. There were five zones indentified and approximately 160 volunteers were on patrol for this event.

Cst. Bongard supervises the Crossing Guard Program and assisted Parks and Recreation Dept. and City Hall with request from Hillcrest School for crossing guard study for two intersections near the school. Cst. Bongard and Community Policing Volunteers conducted a survey and reported the results to the department.

Cst. Bongard assisted with the Children's Safety Village Christmas Party along with numerous volunteers.

Cst. Ling was assigned to the Training Unit and the ERT Team during this time assisting with Court Security of various High Profile Criminal Trials.


The Emergency Response Team members were responsible for the Court Security regarding the Williams Court proceedings at Superior Court. This encompassed seven days in October. These dates do not reflect the weeks of planning and preparation which went into organizing this detail for almost 50 police officers in total including Belleville Police Service ERT, OPP ERT and OPP TRU.

Four Emergency Response Team members were responsible for the Court Security regarding the Hughes Preliminary hearing held during eight days in November at Provincial Court.

Two members of the Emergency Response Team; Cst. Charbonneau and Cst. Abrams were invited to the Canadian Critical Incident Conference held on November 1, 2 and 3, to present their case study/debrief on an incident they were involved in. This conference offers "refresher" seminars and focuses on the requirements of Negotiators, Incident Commanders and Tactical Team Members. In preparation for this, they attended an Incident Commander's course being held in Peterborough and presented an incident debrief.

The Emergency Response Team members assisted with the execution of search warrants, transport of individuals and the execution of search warrants with regard to Project "Needham". Their area of responsibility focused on various locations within Belleville.

Background:

In early January 2011, Cst. Kanyo and Cst. Abrams responded to a business on Bell Boulevard in response to a complaint of an attempted credit card fraud. Police were advised that the suspects had left the area in an unknown direction.

Units on the road were provided a description of this vehicle by dispatchers Elisha Ferguson and Val Brady. Cst. Joly located this vehicle in the parking lot of another business and communicated that information to Cst. Kanyo and Cst. Abrams who attended in the area to assist Cst. Joly.

Police attempted to stop the vehicle on Millennium Drive, but the vehicle fled and proceeded westbound onto Highway 401. Police engaged in a short pursuit that was terminated at Wallbridge-Loyalist Road by Patrol Sergeant Kosta Brindakis due to public safety concerns.

The Officer in Charge of the shift, Staff Sergeant Portt, ensured that the Ontario Provincial Police were notified of this incident as the vehicle was continuing into their jurisdiction. With the information provided by the Belleville Police Service, OPP were able to prepare to stop the vehicle in a safe manner.

The three occupants of the vehicle were returned to the Belleville Police Service where they were charged with flight from police, possession of stolen property, and numerous counts of fraudulent use of a credit card.

The officers involved applied effective investigation initiatives and teamwork to locate and attempt to stop the vehicle; dispatch swiftly communicated information to all units on the road; the patrol sergeant decisively terminated the pursuit; and the OPP were notified with accurate information in an effort to protect the public safety.

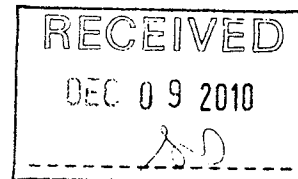


