

7. INFORMATION

(a) New Members (Chief McMullan) Schedule 7(a)
Chief McMullan provided an update related to two new part-time dispatchers, Lisa Mitchell and Kelly Thompson, recently hired by the service. She mentioned that both of these individuals are experienced which will speed the training period.

(b) Thank You Letters & Commendations for Police Officers (Chief McMullan) Schedule 7(b)
Chief McMullan mentioned that the enclosed report is a summary of police officer thank you letters and commendations. She stated that the number of thank you letters being received speaks to the high level of service being provided.

(c) Volunteer Criminal Record Checks (Chief McMullan) Schedule 7(c)
Chief McMullan informed the Board of a number of changes to the process for volunteers to receive criminal records checks. She explained that these changes make it more convenient for volunteers to have their record checks processed more quickly and also ensure that the mandatory requirements implemented by the RCMP are met. Deputy VandeGraaf was thanked for providing workshops related to the importance of completing reference checks of potential volunteers in addition to obtaining criminal record checks. Chief McMullan stated that feedback related to the new process has been extremely positive.

(d) Emergency Response Team (Chief McMullan) Schedule 7(d)
Chief McMullan provided an overview of the work of the Emergency Response Team, for the benefit of new member Chris Lesage. She stated that the service is very proud of our Team standing (1st against the other containment teams and 10th overall) at the Annual Roundup hosted by Ontario Tactical Advisory Board at the beginning of October. The Team was commended for such a high showing and congratulated on their hard work and dedication to the Police Service, the Team and their community.

(e) Service Excellence (Chief McMullan) Schedule 7(e)
Chief McMullan reviewed highlights of the Service Excellence report. She stated that the service is proud of the significant recognition by Justice Byers of the work of Detective Constable McAuley and Detective Constable Jarvis related to a sexual assault incident. Chief also mentioned that the individuals from street crime have done a great deal of work related to break and enters and have done a fantastic job. Constables Code, McNevin, Comeau and Kostuch as well as all officers involved in the break and enter of September 2nd, were commended for their actions, an example of excellent police investigative work.

(f) CCTV (Chief McMullan) Schedule 7(f)
Chief McMullan mentioned that the CCTV grant was announced recently at City Council. She informed the Board that the Police Service has received \$183,000 for this downtown initiative. Work will get underway next week to begin the process of getting the cameras installed. A consultation meeting will be held prior to the installation of the cameras.

(g) "In Trust" Account (Chief McMullan) Schedule 7(g)
The "In Trust" account report was provided for the information of the Board. Chief McMullan fielded questions related to what some of the funds had been used for. It was suggested that a column be added to the report explaining the purpose of the expenses. Chief McMullan will include detail of what the monies were used for on future reports.

There has been a restructuring of areas of responsibility which has resulted in each member of staff handling a larger geographic area. 

Subject: 3rd Quarter Crime Statistics

Recommendation: Receive and File for Information

Background:

Total Crimes:

During the 2010 third quarter there were 1857 actual "crimes" reported, this is a 15% decrease compared to the 2184 reported during the third quarter of 2009. The clearance rate is 51% compared to 47% in 2009.

Homicides:

There were no homicides reported in the third quarter of 2010, however one homicide reported within the same time frame in 2009. The homicide in July 2009 is currently under investigation.

Robberies:

There were 8 robberies reported in the third quarter of 2010, with 9 being reported during this time period in 2009. Of the 8 reported in 2010, two resulted in charges being laid.

Of the 8 Actual robberies reported in the third quarter of 2010, 2 robberies involved the threat of violence and 6 robberies involved actual violence/assaults. Two of the incidents involved a knife as the weapon of choice and in the remaining physical force was used.

Break and Enters:

During the Third quarter of 2010 there were 198 Break and Enters reported of which 18 were unfounded. The clearance rate was 8%. This is compared to 163 reported Break and Enters reported in the third quarter of 2009, with 20 unfounded and an 11% clearance rate.

Motor Vehicle Thefts:

There were 41 reported thefts of motor vehicles with a clearance rate of 37% during the 3rd quarter of 2010. Of these 6 were determined to be unfounded. In the third quarter of 2009 the same number of vehicles was stolen as in the third quarter of 2010 (41) however the clearance rate was lower at 13%.

Assaults:

There were 142 assaults reported in the third quarter of 2010, compared to 173 in 2009, a decrease of 18%. The clearance rate for 2010 is 74% which is a slight decrease from 78% in 2009. Assaults (level 1) accounted for 115 of these incidents and Assault Causing Bodily Harm or with a Weapon accounted for 20 of these. Of these assault types 26 were associated to a Domestic related incident.

Of the 26 spousal related assaults 5 incidents reported involving Bodily Harm inflicted on the victims.

Sex Offences:

There were 24 sexual assaults (3 unfounded) reported during the 3rd quarter with a clearance rate of 62%. In addition there were no other sexual offences* reported within this time frame. This compares to 16 (3 unfounded) sexual assaults during the same time period in 2009 with a 54% clearance rate and 5 other sexual offences with a 100% clearance rate.

*Sexual Interference, Sexual Exploitation, and Invitation to Sexual Touching

Frauds:

There were 86 frauds (5 unfounded) reported during the third quarter of 2010 with a 27% clearance rate compared to 88 (10 unfounded) incidents reported in 2009 with a 41% clearance rate.

Drug Offences:

There were 56 drug related offences, with an 82% clearance rate, reported in this quarter compared to 90 with an 82% clearance during the same time frame of 2009. Of the 56 reported drug related offences reported 37 of these involved Cannabis, 18 were related to Other Controlled Substances and 4 involved Cocaine.

ViCLAS:

There were 24 ViCLAS criteria offences identified and of the 20, 18 submissions were made during the third quarter of 2009. Of the remaining 6 incidents 3 occurred outside our jurisdiction, 2 were deemed to be Unfounded within 30 days and 1 is still outstanding.

Criminal Harassment:

There were 60 incidents of criminal harassment reported with 21 being deemed Unfounded in the third quarter of 2010 compared to 74 being reported in the same time period in 2009 with 21 being deemed as Unfounded.

In 2010, of the 60 incidents of harassment 11 were domestic related while in 2009 criminal harassment was associated to 21 Domestic related incidents.

Utter Threats:

There were 43 incidents with a clearance rate of 62% during the third quarter of 2010. This is a decrease of 54 incidents compared to the 97 incidents with a clearance rate of 71% in the third quarter of 2009.

Background:

False Alarms

There were a total of 442 alarms in the third quarter of 2010. Of the 442 alarms 0 were unfounded leaving an actual total 442 alarms. The breakdown of the alarms is as follows: false alarm-accidental trip 45, false alarm-malfunction 7, false alarm-other 202, false alarm-cancelled prior to officer's arrival 177, alarm hold up 1, and other alarms 10.

This is an increase of 10 % from the 402 alarms reported in 2009 to 442 alarms reported for the same time period in 2010.

There were 109 warnings issued for the third quarter of 2010 compared to 101 issued for 2009. There were 23 - \$50.00 (\$1,150), 8 - \$100 (\$800) and 1 - \$200 (\$200) fines issued for 2010 compared to 22 - \$50.00 (\$1,100), 7 - \$100 (\$700) and 1 - \$200 (\$200) fines issued in 2009.

Domestic Disturbances

A total of 131 domestic disturbances were reported in the third quarter of 2010 compared to 155 in the same time frame for 2009. This is a decrease of 18% from last year within this same time frame.

These 131 domestic disturbances are situations where two people are presently or in the past have been involved in an intimate relationship and are involved in a dispute however there is no physical force or violence involved.

Once the investigation reveals there was an assault, threats, harassment, mischief to property, etc...the call type would be changed from domestic disturbance to reflect the more serious allegation.

Trouble with Youth

Calls involving trouble with youth have decreased by 47%, from 74 occurrences in 2010 compared to 109 occurrences in 2009.

Motor Vehicle Collisions

There were 411 motor vehicle collisions during the third quarter of 2010, an increase of 12% of the 367 reported during the same time period of 2009. There were 48 personal injury collisions reported in the third quarter of 2010, which is almost double to the 23 reported in the second quarter of 2009. There were no fatalities in the third quarter of 2010 and also for the same time period of 2009.

Traffic Complaints

There were a total of 600 traffic complaints during the third quarter of 2010, an increase of 12% compared to the 534 traffic complaints in 2009. Of the 600 traffic complaints there were 4 three day suspensions, 2 seven day suspension for racing, 0 twelve-hr. suspension and 208 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act which is a 10% increase compared to the 189 from the same time period in 2009.

Traffic Management Unit

The Traffic Management Unit laid 590 Provincial Statutes charges which include: Highway Traffic Act, Liquor Licence Act, Trespass to Property and Safe Streets Act. 14 Criminal Code charges were laid during this time frame. There were 188 Calls for Service with 206 reports being submitted.

Commercial Vehicle Blitz - On September 13-14 in Belleville and September 20-21 in Kingston officers participated in a commercial vehicle enforcement blitz with members of the Ministry of Transportation, Ministry of the Environment, OPP and Kingston Police Service. Officers conducted safety compliance checks on commercial vehicles in the Belleville area during a two day period resulting in 37 charges being laid, 56 vehicles were inspected and 30 vehicles removed from the roadway as being deemed unfit resulting in 14 removed permanently as unsafe. A safety non-compliance rate for vehicles removed was 53.5%. The 2 day enforcement campaign results for Belleville are as follows:

- 44 Level 1 inspections (full mechanical)
- 12 Level 2 inspections (lights etc.)
- 2 Level 3 inspections (paperwork)
- 20 Vehicles out of service with 25 defects found
- 36 charges.
- 7 vehicles had plates removed...
- 47 Ministry of Environment inspections.
- Agencies involved, MTO, MOE, OPP, KPF, BPS,
- 45% of vehicles inspected out of service.

Officers from Belleville Police Service attended a similar 2 days blitz in Kingston Sept 20th and 21st resulting in similar results. 57 Vehicles inspected, 36 charges, 31 out of service with 14 permanent removals, a safety non-compliance rate of 54.3%.

Queens Homecoming - Officers from the TMU were requested by Kingston Police to assist with traffic duties including RIDE checks during the nights of the annual Queen's Homecoming. Officers attended and assisted Kingston. No significant issues were reported.

Foot Bridge - Officers conducted a survey with the assistance of the Community Policing Volunteers regarding the usage of cyclists using the foot bridge. Officers conducted enforcement and monitored the bridge usage and determined it was an environmental issue rather than an enforcement issue. Several solutions were recommended in the report that was submitted.

Participants in Project Erase – ROCKFEST and RIDE July 22, 23, 24 - Officers from the Traffic Management Unit assisted with Rock fest maintaining orderly vehicle and pedestrian flow around the Empire Theatre and the downtown core on the nights of Rock Fest. RIDE was conducted on the Friday and Saturday nights with no criminal charges being laid, in excess of 500 vehicles were checked.

Back to School Initiatives- The TMU set up with officers from uniform patrol on Dundas St. W for a 2 1/2 hr period during the morning rush hour. Officers issued 433 Provincial Offence notices with the highest speed reading of 86 km/h in the posted 50 km/h zone. Officers also stopped one motorist for speeding and he was arrested for driving while prohibited, this was the drivers 2nd charge in 2 yrs for driving while prohibited as a result of an original over 80mgs charge. His vehicle was impounded for 90 days and he will appear in Criminal Court in October. A second motorist was stopped for speeding and through investigation it was found that he was driving under suspension since 1990 for unpaid fines. He was issued a summons for the offence and will appear in Provincial Offences Court in October. Total Charges, 48 speeding, 1 drive prohibited under the Criminal Code which resulted in a 90 impoundment for the vehicle, 1 drive under suspension Highway Traffic Act.

Public Service Announcements - Cst. Stitt attended at two local radio stations to do a voice byte for school safety to promote the TMU's enhanced back to school initiatives. This is part of an education program to ensure safety of all students returning to school. Increased enforcement was conducted during the first two weeks of school focusing on school areas with an emphasis on zero tolerance.

Distacted Driving - In the fall of 2009 the Province of Ontario introduced legislation that prohibits the use of hand-held cell phones and other wireless devices while driving in Ontario. In February 2010 police began enforcement of this law. In 10 days during the month of August Belleville Police Service Traffic Management Unit have issued more than 25 offence notices in relation to this legislation. The set fine for this offence is \$155.00. Total number of cell phone tickets to date in 2010 is 115.

Veterans Bridge Opening- Officers attended the opening of the Veterans Bridge Opening assisting with traffic direction while the roadway was closed. Members of the Community Services Unit, School Response and Community Policing volunteers assisted with the Veterans Parade and parking.

Serious/Fatal Collisions: Officers are currently investigating 3 serious collisions.

On the 30th of August at approximately 4:10 p.m. a serious injury motor vehicle collision occurred at Old Hwy 2 and Old Kingston Rd.

On the 5th of September at approximately 1:00 p.m. a serious injury collision occurred on Airport Parkway approximately 300 meters west of Mitchell Rd.

On the 14th of September 2010 at approximately 2:54 a.m. a serious injury motor vehicle collision occurred between a pedestrian and vehicle on a private parking lot on North Front Street.

“Junkers and Clunkers”:

On the 6th of October 2010, Belleville Police Traffic Management Unit, Kingston Police Traffic Services and the Ministry of Environment conducted a safety defect enforcement campaign focusing on passenger vehicles and small commercial trucks. A total of 17 vehicles received a full mechanical fitness inspection resulting in 15 of the vehicles failing (88%). 19 vehicles received preliminary inspections with 14 being taken out of service for minor defects that could be fixed prior to leaving or were towed away to be repaired (defective brakes, tires, permits or minor mechanical issues 73%). 21 Emission inspections were completed with 5 failures = 23%. A total of 22 charges were laid including 4 no insurance, 1 suspended driver and 1 take auto without consent. 9 vehicles were determined to be so unsafe that it would not be feasible to repair them to safety standards.

Canine

In the third quarter of 2010 the Canine Unit responded to 123 calls for service in the capacity of assisting Uniform Operations. He laid 25 Criminal charges, 4 Highway Traffic Act charges, 1 Liquor Licence Act charge and 1 Controlled Drug and Substance Act charge.

Specific to the Canine responsibility, the officer conducted 17 tracks, which included 11 callouts, directly assisted uniform Operations with 3 arrests, was involved in 3 incidents where he assisted the Emergency Response Team with Controlled Drug Substance Act warrants and conducted 2 building searches. The Canine Unit also participated in 1 demonstration during the City Day Camp held in the Safety Village and 1 Missing Person search. A total of 20 training hours were conducted by Canine.

Community Response officers/Children's Safety Village

The Community Response Officers were involved with the following special events in the City of Belleville during the third quarter; Canada Day Celebration and Belleville Ethnic Festival. where a course was set up and Jeeps from the Children's Safety Village were available for the children to operate. A "Safe Driving" certificate was given to the children upon completion of the course. The "Lock it or Lose It" program was also conducted throughout the parking lots. Officers also participated in the Child Seat Clinic, Bike Rodeo in the Safety Village, Fun in the Sun event with the Housing Unit and a four day City Day Camp event held at the Safety Village.

Cst. Miranda Orr implemented and organized "Quinte Children's Fun Day"; a Four-on-Four ball hockey tournament to raise funds for the "Playing for Keeps" program (helping underprivileged children be involved in activities/sports, example outfitting children in our community with donated hockey equipment)

Officers sit on the following committees; Belleville Youth Justice Committee, Quintac, Safe Schools advisory Committee, Salep, COSP, CMHA, C-tap, Tap-c and Y.I.T., participating in several meetings in the mentioned time frame. One officer is a standing Board Member of the Quinte Children's Foundation. One officer is the Crime Stopper Coordinator, Community Policing Facilitator and Safety Village administrator.

Officers assisted schools with lockdown procedural issues and stood by during lockdown tests.

Officers attended the Threat Assessment Protocol committee meeting to review and the current Protocol. An Officer assisted the First Nation Technical Institute with further development of Threat Assessment Protocol and attended cultural awareness training.

In partnership with and under the guidelines set out in the Community Threat Assessment Protocol, an officer assisted the School Board with one Threat Assessment.

Officers attended the following meetings: Children's Safety Village board and the Hastings Prince Edward School Board curriculum advisors in a joint effort to revise the curriculum for the Children's Safety Village grade three program, two safe schools meeting with the Hastings and Prince Edward District School Board, COSP (regarding the Youth Referral Program), school crossing guard orientation, Crime Stoppers and the Belmont Nursing home to advise on a Mock Evacuation scenario.

The Community Response Officers responded to 38 occurrences and 22 reportable incidents of which 7 criminal charges related to patrol duties were laid. Officers also assisted schools with 12 non-reportable incidents including restorative justice sessions and trouble shooting where incidents have not reached a reportable level however benefited by Police intervention. There were also two referrals to the John Howard Society and two within the mental health community. Officers participated in planning and development of Anti-Bullying Week activities that commences during the week starting November 15th, 2010.

Promoted and forwarded the development of a new initiative called C.O.P.S. by seeking interest and funding and recruiting students.

The Community Response Officer made presentations to grade nine classes welcoming them and introducing the role of police in there school.

An officer assisted with the preparation and implementation of the Free Volunteer Criminal Record checks that commenced at the beginning of August. These checks will continue on a bi-weekly schedule, alternating times of 12:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m. one Tuesday and 4:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. on the other.

A total of 4 grade three classes were facilitated within the Safety Village.

E.R.T.

In July, two officers attended the 1 week C 8 patrol rifle instructor course. This was in preparation for the conversion from shotgun to patrol carbine.

The E.R.T. team assisted the Criminal Investigation Branch with an evidence search over two days with regards to a homicide. Tactical officers assisted the drug unit with a disposable evidence search.

In September one officer started his 12 week Basic Tactical Officer Course (B.T.O.C) hosted by the Ottawa police Service. One officer was the recipient of a scholarship from Blackhawk Tactical to attend a six day tactical conference in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, USA. He won a Blackhawk Special Operations Ram in a draw for the team. An officer attended at the Peterborough Police Service and debriefed a call for their Incident Commander course.

In August ERT officers assisted twice in the capacity of High Risk court security detail, involving a murder suspect were the offence had occurred in O.P.P. jurisdiction. The E.R.T was tasked with High Court security detail that involved planning for the trial of Russell Williams to take place in October. This was a very high profile event with nationwide coverage.

Background:

On 8 October, 2010 at 1:59 a.m., police were called to the rear of a strip mall on Dundas Street East in response to a complaint of a possible break and enter in progress. Constable Mark Harry and Constable Laura Empey arrived on scene and checked the area. Constable Harry located a 15 year old male hiding in the area and Constable Empey located evidence that supported the incident. Through their investigation and quick response time, this led to the arrest of the 15 year old male for Break and Enter with Intent to commit an Indictable Offence, Breach of Undertaking and Possession of Break Instruments. This incident is still before the courts. The Youth Criminal Justice Act prohibits the release of the name of the youth.

The commitment and professionalism displayed by members of the Belleville Police Service Police in preparing and executing a court security plan to provide security for the high profile and risk William's trial is to be commended. The Ontario Provincial Police contributed in assisting our members in fulfilling the requirements of the Belleville Police Service to provide court security. It goes without saying that this trial received world wide attention and our members have been recognized by both local and larger media outlets for their professionalism and hard work. This "shout out" goes to both the officers and civilians who attended the court and the members who had their shifts and days off altered and/or cancelled to accommodate this task. I am proud to say that this significant undertaking went on without a hitch. Members of the judiciary, court staff, victims and their families as well as members of the community thanked our members for their professionalism. The Toronto Sun stated that "Belleville Police Service set the standard".

Subject: Belleville Downtown Improvement Area Partnership

Background:

The Belleville Downtown Improvement Area Board of Management held their Annual General meeting on Wednesday November 10, 2010. Belleville Police Service is currently involved in several key initiatives with the BDIA. Subject: Moira River Foot Bridge Cyclist Issues

Recommendation: Review and file for information

Background:

The Belleville Police Service received a complaint regarding cyclists using the bridge in violation of a no bicycle bylaw on the Moira River foot bridge. The Traffic Management Unit was assigned to complete a study on the issue. Officers monitored the bridge on numerous dates during the summer to observe pedestrian and cyclist traffic. Members of the Community Policing Volunteers also conducted a survey on the bridge on staggered dates and hours of use. Results of the survey indicated that the bridge is regularly used by pedestrians, cyclists and skateboarders alike in a moderate volume. It is apparent from the survey that cyclists and skateboarders using the bridge are non compliant with the by law between 23-37 per cent of the time.

Several issues were identified, with obstructions to the signage being removed and the bylaw number being added to the posted sign. Enforcement of the signage at best would be time consuming and labour intensive. The location of the bridge severely restricts the location that an officer would be able to set up and monitor the locations. The visibility of the officer as determined from a previous monitoring date was quite evident to cyclists with most dismounting and continuing while walking their bicycle.

It is suggested that the issue of solution is more environmental than situational. One possible recommendation would be to install off set fencing or gates that would be portable to allow maintenance of the bridge but would force cyclist to dismount to enter the gates. There are similar structures in place at the Lott Dam Bridge. The cost and possibility of the structures is not known.
