Subject: Use of Force/Training Unit 2010 Annual Report

Chief's Recommendation:

“That the Belleville Police Service’s Board receive and File for Information the Use of Force/Training Unit 2010 Annual Report.”

Background:

The Training unit has seen some changes during 2010. In March 2010, Constable Lockwood was reassigned temporarily to the Training Unit to assist at the time, Constable Asimis with the spring use of force training. Over the last year, the Training Unit has taken on some new responsibilities, including firearms management, clothing & equipment supply and all incoming course facilitations. Due to the increased demands on the Training Unit, there were early discussions regarding the possibility of increasing the strength of the unit by attaching a second member to it.

In the late summer, Constable Asimis was promoted to sergeant and was reassigned to uniform patrol. Constable Lockwood was selected to replace Sergeant Asimis as the lead trainer/instructor. Management decided to add one more member to the Training Unit on a part time basis. Constable Ling was selected as that member and divides his time between the Training Unit and the Community Policing Unit.

During the fall and winter of 2010, Constable Lockwood attended numerous train the trainer course and received all his mandatory certifications in order to perform his duties within the unit.

Every police officer and special constable performing full active duties within the Belleville Police Service received mandatory use of force re-qualification & training.

In 2010 our officers were given four days of training. Two days in the spring and two days in the fall. They were trained in the following areas:

- Firearms (pistol, shotgun & carbine transition)
- Live general patrol scenarios – (judgment, officer safety, authorities & tactical communication)
- Immediate Rapid Deployment
- Defensive Tactics
- Transition from Sabre Red to CTS aerosol
- Fitness Pin Test

Constable Lockwood Was selected as the new Training Officer and attended the following courses:


- Use of Force Instructor – OPC
- Suspect Apprehension Pursuit Instructor – Hamilton/OPC
- Conducted Energy Weapon Instructor – OPC
- Carbine Instructor – Belleville/OPC
- CTS Munitions Instructor – Ottawa/MD Charlton Training Division

Subject: 2nd Quarter Crime Statistics

Chief's Recommendation:

"That the Belleville Police Service's Board receive and file for information the second quarter crime statistics report."

Background:

Crimes:

During the 2011 second quarter there were 1881 actual "crimes" reported compared to the 1871 reported during the 2nd quarter of 2010. The clearance rate is 52% compared to 54% in 2010.

Homicides:

There were no homicides reported for the second quarter in 2011 compared with one reported homicide reported in the second quarter of 2010. However in April 2011 an arrest was made of a male who was subsequently charged with second degree murder. This is as a result of the death of an elderly lady in July 2010.

Robberies:

There were 7 robberies reported in the second quarter of 2011. In the second quarter of 2010 there were 5 robberies. The clearance rate for the second quarter in 2011 was 28% compared to a clearance rate of 20% in 2010.

Two of the robberies involve purse snatching with violence.

Break and Enters:

During the second quarter of 2011 there were 149 break and enters reported of which 12 were unfounded. The clearance rate was 25%. This is compared to 153 reported Break and Enters reported in the second quarter of 2010, and an 18% clearance rate.

Two break and enters involved the theft of firearms.

Motor Vehicle Thefts:

There were 26 reported thefts of motor vehicles (3 unfounded) during the 2nd quarter of 2011 with a clearance rate of 23% compared to a reported 25 theft of motor vehicles and a clearance rate of 36% in 2010.

Two of the reported vehicle thefts involved all terrain vehicles

Assaults:

There were 152 assaults reported in the second quarter (8 unfounded), compared to 118 in 2010, an increase of 28.8%. The clearance rate for 2011 is 73% compared to a clearance rate of 89% for 2010.

Two of the reported assaults were against police officers.

Sex Offences:

There were 43 sexual offences (6 unfounded) reported during the second quarter with a clearance rate of 86%. This compares to 15 (4 unfounded) sexual assaults during the same time period in 2010 with a 130% clearance rate.

Included in this 130% clearance rate in 2010 would be sex related incidents reported previous to the second quarter however cleared within this quarter

Frauds:

There were 77 frauds (5 unfounded) reported during the second quarter of 2011 with a 52% clearance rate, compared to the 97 (6 unfounded) incidents reported in 2010 with a 40% clearance rate.

Drug Offences:

There were 66 drug offences, with an 84% clearance rate, reported in this quarter compared to 90 with a 76% clearance during the same time frame in 2010. This represents a 26.1% decrease in reported drug offences in 2011 compared to 2nd quarter 2010.

ViCLAS:

There were 18 ViCLAS criteria offences identified in the second quarter of 2011 compared to 21 ViCLAS criteria reports submitted in the second quarter in 2010. There were an additional 15 ViCLAS discretionary reports submitted in 2011 compared to 22 in the second quarter 2010.

Of the 15 discretionary reports submitted for the second quarter 2011, 7 were for indecent acts and 3 were for Suspicious Persons/Prowling.

One male person has been arrested and charged with two counts of indecent Act.

ViCLAS submissions are completed by the investigating officer within 20 days of the initial report.

Criminal Harassment:

There were 65 incidents with a 75% clearance rate in the first second of 2011 compared to 67 in the same time period of 2010 with a 66% clearance rate.

Two of the Criminal Harassment complaints have an unknown offender.

Utter Threats:

There were 59 incidents with a clearance rate of 57% during the first 2nd of 2011. This compares to 75 incidents with a clearance rate of 98% in the second quarter of 2010.

Presentations

Sgt Grant Boulay conducted a one day lecture on the Williams case at the Canadian Police College in Ottawa to the Senior Forensic Identification Course.

Liquor Licence Compliance

The Belleville Police Service has an ongoing working relationship with the AGCO (Alcohol & Gaming Commission) where they work together to address any ongoing issues and licence compliance in relation to liquor establishments within the City Limits. In the second quarter of 2011 Inspectors with the AGCO, assisted by the Belleville Police Service conducted one compliance check within these establishments. There were no charges laid during this inspection.

In April this year the Belleville Police Service instituted a new process which tracks all Liquor Licence Act and Criminal Code violations which occur within or near a liquor establishment.



Background:

FALSE ALARMS

There were a total of 369 alarms in the 2nd quarter of 2011. Of the 369 alarms 0 were unfounded leaving an actual total 369 alarms. The breakdown of the alarms is as follows:

There was a 1.9% decrease in the number of alarms from the 376 alarms reported in 2010 to 369 alarms reported for the same time period in 2011.

DOMESTIC DISTURBANCES

A total of 115 domestic disturbances were reported in the 2nd quarter of 2011 compared to 118 in the same time frame for 2010. This is a decrease of 2.6% from last year within this same time frame.

These 115 domestic disturbances are situations where two people are presently or in the past have been involved in an intimate relationship and are involved in a dispute however there is no physical force or violence involved.

Once the investigation reveals there was an assault, threats, harassment, mischief to property, etc...the call type would be changed from domestic disturbance to reflect the more serious allegation.

TROUBLE WITH YOUTH

Calls involving trouble with youth have decreased by 31.4%, from 70 occurrences in 2011 compared to 92 occurrences in 2010.

MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISIONS

There were 331 motor vehicle collisions during the 2nd quarter of 2011, a decrease of 11.5 % of the 369 reported during the same time period of 2010. There were 32 personal injury collisions reported in the 1st quarter of 2011, which is a decrease of 50% to the 48 reported in the 2nd quarter of 2010. There was 0 fatalities in the 2nd quarter of 2011 and 3 for the same time period of 2010.

TRAFFIC COMPLAINTS

There were a total of 561 traffic complaints during the 1st quarter of 2011, an increase of 10.7% compared to the 501 traffic complaints in 2010. Of the 561 traffic complaints there were:

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT UNIT

The Traffic Management Unit laid 889 Provincial Statutes charges, which include: Highway Traffic Act, Liquor Licence Act, Trespass to Property and Safe Streets Act. There were 10 Criminal Code Charges for Impaired, FTR, Theft and Breach and 1 CDSA. There were 270 Calls for Service and 247 Reports being submitted. In the 2nd quarter of 2010, the Traffic Management Unit laid 147 Provincial Statutes charges and 2 Criminal Code charges. There were 117 calls for service and 87 reports were submitted.

Serious & Fatal Collisions

Officers are currently investigating 3 serious/fatal collisions.

On the 2nd of April 2011 TMU officers investigated a serious injury collision involving a 57-year-old male operating an all terrain vehicle on Point Anne Lane. He was thrown from the ATV and suffered serious injuries, as he was not wearing a helmet. The driver was charged with 3 offences; 1 Criminal code, 1 Highway Traffic Act and 1 under the Compulsory Automobile Insurance Act.

On the 14th of April 2011, a single motor vehicle collision occurred on Phillipston Rd. An SUV driven by an 18-year-old female left the roadway and rolled injuring the occupants. The driver was charged with 1 count under the Highway Traffic Act.

On the 26th of June 2011, Officers from the TMU investigated a serious single vehicle collision on Prince of Wales Drive. A 50 yr old male was operating his motorcycle when he accidentally accelerated rapidly from a stop sign, losing control and striking a tree. The operator was a learning rider and suffered serious life threatening injuries being transported to Kingston General Hospital for emergency surgery. He remains in hospital.

Commercial Vehicle Blitz

Officers from Belleville Police Service conducted a 2-day blitz in June with the Ministry of Environment, Ministry of Transportation and OPP Heavy Truck Unit in Belleville. Officers had 65 level one CVSA inspections, a 34% out of service rate, 58 charges, and 41 Ministry of Environment inspections as well. Three vehicles were removed from service completely due to safety defects that would not be repaired.

Training

Cst. Groen and Stitt attended the Ontario Police College for the Ontario Association of the Chiefs of Police Technical Traffic Training Seminar on the 25th and 26th of May. Officers learned about new breath testing equipment, collision investigation techniques, including staged collisions and frauds. Numerous other topics/seminars were discussed.

CANINE

Cst. Joly conducted 12 tracks, which included 9 callouts, directly assisted ERT with 1 arrest and Uniform with 5 arrests. Canine trained for 30 hours during this quarter.

In the 2nd quarter of 2011 the Canine Unit dealt with 83 occurrences in the capacity of his Platoon assignment. Canine laid 8 Criminal Code Charges, 2 Liquor Licence Act, 1 Highway Traffic Act and 1 ORVA.

COMMUNITY RESPONSE

The Community Response officers responded to 20 reportable occurrences pertaining to schools and 127 reportable incidences were self generated by the officers.

Training Conferences

Cst. Orr attended threat assessment Level one and Level two courses. Cst. Verbeek conducted two community threat assessments involving two different male students. Community threat assessments involve members of the community partners within the signed protocol. The community members range from school authorities and staff, to police and other agencies such as the Children's Aid Society, and other stakeholders involved in the process. This partnership, with all of the community partners, is essential to share all information to ensure that the proper measures and precautions are taken to assist the student. These assessments are conducted with regard to their behaviour and possible future behaviour. The result was an extensive assessment process to determine the next course of action.

Presentations

There were several presentations during this quarter, which includes seven Bullying presentations conducted on bullying and cyberbullying; three drug presentations within the elementary schools; and a presentation on social networking at Loyalist College within the department of Student Success. Officers attended St. Theresa Secondary School for their Career Day. Officers had a display and spoke to students about a carer in policing.

Assistance to Schools

Cst. Orr instructed 16 classes in the grade four program (bike safety) from Hastings and Prince Edward School Board and Algonquin and Lakeshore School Board within the Children's Safety Village. She also assisted the Algonquin and Lakeshore School Board with the implementation of the Safe Schools committees.

She assisted the elementary schools with year end lockdown drills.

Cst. Orr provided and guided four students from Nicholson Catholic College, Centennial Secondary School and St. Paul's Secondary School with projects and initiatives within the village.

A total of 10 formal presentations were conducted in a classroom setting and 3 impromptu presentations were conducted at the various high schools, including Quinte Secondary School, Moira Secondary School, St. Theresa Secondary School and Nicholson Catholic College. The material consisted of a diverse array of topics ranging from general policing, cyber bullying, Internet safety, as well as an open forum with a question and answer period.

Lockdown drills were conducted at 4 high schools, including Moira Secondary School, St Theresa Secondary School, Centennial Secondary School and Quinte Secondary School. The drills consisted of all levels of the school lockdown procedure, and an inspection of the results as well as a constructive critique for improvement purposes. A meeting with Albert College Head Master Keith Stansfield was conducted to review the lockdown procedure at Albert College.

Other Assignments

Other assignments were completed which included updating the curriculum for bike safety through Safe Kids Canada and assisted with the new web design and the up-coming implementation for the Children's Safety Village.

Cst. Orr is an active board member with the Quinte Children's Foundation and committee member with the Canadian Cancer Society.

In conclusion, her time was devoted to putting together the Awards Ceremony, as well as, the Citizen Awards Ceremony. The case involving a youth and two threat assessments were concluded.

Cst. Verbeek was involved in a major sexual assault investigation in April 2011 which consisted of historical sexual assaults dating back 2 years and current assaults beginning September 2010 – April 2011. The result was a male student charged with three counts of sexual assault.

Two Assault Bodily Harm investigations were conducted in this quarter. The first consisted of an unprovoked attack in the hallway of a school. The victim sustained injuries that required medical attention. The perpetrator was identified and charged with 1 count of Assault Cause Bodily Harm.

The second Assault Bodily Harm consisted of a victim being repeatedly struck, again an unprovoked attack and the result was the victim receiving a concussion. The perpetrator was identified and charged with 1 count of Assault Cause Bodily Harm.

In June an investigation involving spray-painting at a school resulted in charges of Mischief over \$5000 being laid against a male youth.

An Arson investigation was conducted. It consisted of a student setting a garbage can on fire, on school property near the technical wing. The school staff put the fire out however, if the fire spread it may have caused considerable damage or even injury. The result was a male charged with arson.

During the Federal Election a local school contacted police with regard to an adult male, who was a possible SOR registrant. Investigation revealed that the male was on conditions not to be at or near a school. The result was a charge of breach of probation.

Community Policing

In April the Community Policing volunteers organized the Annual Pitter Patter run at Loyalist College. There were 141 runners (20 more than last year) and the event raised over \$4,000.00. "Pink Shirt Day" is a day of awareness for anti-bullying in schools. The volunteers assisted with t-shirts sales and distribution.

In May, the Annual Police Week was held at the Quinte Mall. Information material was on display, as well as BPS vehicles. "Fill the Cruiser" was utilized to assist the Gleaner's Food Bank. The "Name the Patch" contest was held and the male youth who won had lunch with Chief McMullan. The Community Policing volunteers assisted with the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics, Cops for Cancer at Dewe's Independent location, Project Safety Treat Promoting Street and Bicycle Safety in conjunction with Dairy Queen, whereby patrol officer's who observe youth riding their bicycle's safely are given a certificate for a free treat at Dairy Queen. The volunteers also assisted with the "Walk a Mile in her Shoes" event held on Front Street in support of local women's shelters.

In June the volunteers assisted with the Quinte Crime Stopper's golf tournament, The "Cops, Kids and Fishing Derby" held at Victoria Park and the BPS Police Auction. They also started preparations for participation in the Special Events for the summer.

Cst. Ling attended training at the Ontario Police College on the new OACP Community Engagement and Mobilization model. Upon his return, he conducted training with the service in conjunction with the launch of Zone Policing. He made 6 presentations to high schools on the topic of "Cops and Drugs" and Loyalist College on Mental Health and Ethics.

E.R.T.

In April, a 3 member ERT element assisted Uniform patrol in clearing a mini van parked at BGH after receiving a report of a male inside the van holding a rifle. After negative results were made at attempting to communicate with the person in the van, member's utilized heavy vests; helmets and a ballistic shield to safely approach the van. It was determined that the male was deceased.

ERT members assisted the Criminal Investigations Branch with arresting a male murder suspect and a female for other criminal offences.

In May, members assisted the BPS Drug Unit in the execution of a CDSA Search warrant that resulting in 3 persons being arrested. There was an ERT team call-out for a search regarding a despondent male who had walked away from his residence near Point Anne. ERT liaised with Uniform Patrol and K9 who had conducted a preliminary search and were unable to locate the male. This search was at night making it more difficult. Cst Ling was the search coordinator. ERT members located the male approximately 400m from his residence, deceased. ERT members also enlisted the assistance from the volunteer firemen, which included the use of their thermal imaging devices.

In June, team members assisted Longarm members in the execution of 2 CDSA Search warrants, which were executed simultaneously, resulting in 5 persons being arrested. There was a team call-out for a search regarding a missing 11-year-old female. This call involved CIB, Surveillance units, Uniform patrol, Street crime, ERT and K-9. The missing girl was eventually located safe and sound. ERT assisted in the execution of 2 simultaneous CDSA search warrants assisting Project Longarm. Four persons were arrested.

Training

Search and Rescue: Cst. Ling completed both the Search Managers' course and the Touratech software course. D/Sgt. Geen completed the Touratech software course. D/Sgt. Geen instructed during the GIT class here at the BPS on "Operational Planning". Cst. Ling attended the OPP Regional HQ and completed a training day with their East Region search Managers. Cst. Verbeek attended a manual breachers course hosted through OTAB. Two new members were identified through a selection process. The members are Cst. Donaldson and Cst. Erwin.

Annual Training week at Connaught Ranges and Training Centre – This was a very successful training week. The members put in excess of 60 hours during this week and trained hard. Connaught Ranges are used by many tactical teams because of their training facilities including numerous pistol and rifle ranges, gas huts and simulated houses. With the rifle ranges, members were able to utilize the "Butts" system which allowed team members to practice shooting skills with moving targets both up and down and directional at the 100m distance. This was also a good test of the sighting equipment on the rifles. The houses allow ERT members to use simunition, distraction devices, smoke and practice a variety of team tactics including Hostage Rescue Training, injured person rescue and stealth throughout the week. Also the ERT Medics always attend during this annual training week allowing the teams to strengthen the working relationship.

Throughout the week, the Medics reviewed our personal equipment in case they should have to quickly remove helmets, heavy vests or make safe a weapon. They also update every BPS ERT member's medical history in case of an emergency. All members annually test their gas mask as well during a variety of scenarios throughout the week. During the week, police also reviewed some of the Medic's equipment should the need arise where we are assisting them ie: locating equipment inside their vehicle, using the stretcher, drag sleds or driving the ambulance.

Subject: Capital Budget Repairs

Ontario's Police Leaders Ask: *"Will your party commit to sustainable funding for programs that provide police services and our communities with funding for police officers (CPP, 1000 Officers Program) in perpetuity and ensure that funding for such programs have a COLA (cost of living adjustment) component?"*

Sustainable Provincial Funding for Community Safety Programs

Ontario's Police Leaders Ask: *"Will your party commit to providing permanent funding for critically important specialized programs such as TAVIS, PAVIS, the Provincial Strategy for the Protection of Children Against Internet Exploitation, and other programs?"*


Commitment to supporting professional policing as the preferred policing option for the people of Ontario

Ontario's Police Leaders Ask: *"Will your party commit to initiating a legislative/regulatory review of Special Constables in Ontario within 120 days of the 2011 Provincial Election as requested by Ontario's police leaders in OACP Resolution 2007-02 and the OACP White Paper Report on Special Constables in Ontario (June 2009)?
