Chiefs recommendation: That the board review and file for information.

Information factors:

On June 3rd the Belleville Police Service received a call for service from the OPP to assist in relation to a male person in acute mental distress and suicidal.

Our officers attended a residence in our policing area that borders the OPP jurisdiction and noted that the male person being sought, attended this residence in a vehicle at a high rate of speed and then fled the area.


Our officers developed a hasty plan to stop the vehicle in a safe location that would not put the lives of any members of the community in jeopardy. Further the officers developed a plan to ensure that their actions did not compromise the safety of the male person who was in crisis.

The plan was put in place and the resulted in the male person being taken into custody to get the required medical assistance during his time in crisis. The arrest plan worked extremely well without anyone being injured or damage to property. These high risk calls have a propensity for less than desirable outcomes due to the unpredictability of the person in crisis. The following officers are to be commended for their excellent work:

Chief's recommendation: That the Board review and approve the recommendation from Chief Callaghan.

On the 27th of July, 2019 at 2:36 a.m. police and fire received several calls regarding a residential structure fire at 190 Dundas St. E. One of the callers was trapped inside the burning house in an upstairs apartment. BFD entered the burning building and were able to locate and remove the 35-year-old male who died a short time later at the hospital.

In cooperation with the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office, it was determined that the fire was intentionally set which included the use of an accelerant.

The fire was deliberately set at the front door to the apartment which blocked the only means of escape from the second floor, which was the location of the deceased. Living on the main floor of the residence, and home at the time of the fire, was a family of 3 including a one-year old child who thankfully were able to escape. The investigation was deemed a homicide.

The investigative team began to focus on canvassing which included the capturing of nearby CCTV (which continued to expand as the investigation progressed), interviewing numerous witnesses and a physical evidence search of the area. This search resulted in the finding of key evidence (the accelerant bottle) in a drainage basin a block away from the scene.

The information gleaned to this point in the investigation provided the affiant the grounds to secure search warrants for numerous electronic devices of key people in the investigation. As a result, numerous devices were seized which resulted in grounds to arrest and charge a female for 2nd Degree Murder and Arson – Disregard for Human Life.

July 15, 2021

The investigative team developed both an arrest and interview plan in order to safely arrest the female, while securing additional evidence from her. The suspect was arrested on the 6th of May, 2020. Following the arrest and during this 2nd interview, the female admitted to being present at the residence when the fire was set, however continued to accuse the 2nd person of setting the fire. The investigative team thoroughly investigated this statement and were able to disprove it.

Throughout the investigation, 50 interviews were conducted, 20 search warrants/production orders were executed and 12 electronic devices were seized and analyzed. These 12 devices resulted in hundreds of pages in phone records to review.

Officers spent over 60 hours preparing witnesses and involved officers for the five-day Preliminary Hearing held in January 2021.

At the conclusion of the Preliminary Hearing, Defence Counsel offered to resolve the charges with a plea to Manslaughter with a 10-year custodial sentence minus time served which was accepted by the Crown.

Chief's recommendation: That the board review file the attached information from Chief Callaghan.

On Monday, July 5, 2021 at approximately 1000 hrs, the Belleville Police Service attended at Bridge Street United Church with respect to a male person in acute mental health crisis.

The 24 year old male person was on a 20' scaffold and was suicidal. The staff at the Bridge Street United Church was unable to deescalate the situation and our officers responded quickly to resolve the issue and ensure the male person was able to acquire the health care he required.

With the assistance of the Belleville Fire Department and the Hastings Paramedic Services staged on scene our officers began negotiating with the male person in crisis. Our officers isolated the others in the church and were able to provide a quiet area to speak to the male in a calm setting. It took approximately 20 minutes for the officers to negotiate the male to climb down, where he was apprehended under the Mental Health Act and taken to the Belleville General Hospital for a psychological assessment.

It is important to note that since January of 2020 there have been a 118 incidents with this male between Cobourg Police Service, the O.P.P. and our police service.

Chair Miller welcomed those in attendance via social media and noted that the Meeting was taking place in a socially distanced setting.

Chief Callaghan noted that Special Constable Burley is indeed a goodwill ambassador for the Belleville Police Service and is often the first person a member of the public meets either when entering the Station or over the telephone, where they are always met with respect and patience. Special Constable Burley also has the innate ability to provide a calming effect when dealing with the public.

Chair Miller stated that he has known Special Constable Burley for quite a long time and remarked at his continual pleasant and congenial manner. Chair Miller noted that Special Constable Burley was a credit to the Belleville Police Service and thanked him for his 20 years of exemplary service.

Deputy Chief Barry thanked Special Constable Burley for his positive attitude when working in a stressful environment.

Special Constable Burley thanked the Board and noted that he aimed to be the best Special Constable he could be.

(a) 2021 1st Quarter Crime Statistics Report (10:20 a.m.)

At the request of Chair Miller, Chief Callaghan provided an overview of the 1st Quarter Crime Statistics Report.

Chief Callaghan noted that for the vast majority of matters there has been a decrease in numbers, however, due to two ongoing homicide investigations, a 200% increase is reflected in the Report. Robberies have increased 100%, however it should be noted that the Service has a clearance rate of 75% which is an improvement from 50% in 2020.

Chief Callaghan stated that there is a direct correlation between the number of drug busts, being carried out by Project Renewal, and the increased number of break and enters noting that additional attention will be given to this matter.

Chief Callaghan noted that there appears to be a trend in that individuals arrested in the a.m. are being released in the p.m. which the Service finds challenging. The Cobourg Chief of Police recently spoke about the revolving door within the judicial system.

Mr. Angus noted that there is a massive amount of detail and statistics contained within this report and inquired as to how the information was utilized.

Chief Callaghan noted that the Traffic Unit is provided the information and can identify high collision intersections and be pro-active in this regard. He stated that the City's Traffic Committee also receives the report for information and planning purposes.

It was decided that going forward the report would be placed before the Board on a semi-annual basis.

(d) 2021 1st Quarter Community Service Report (10:26 a.m.)

Chief Callaghan advised that Officers Menna and Gervais have been working on community initiatives within the downtown core and have been very proactive in the community reaching out to various agencies and building relationships.

Chief Callaghan noted that there has been a 403% increase in calls for service that correlate directly to homelessness in the City and noted that tent cities have also started to appear.

In regards to the Welcoming Streets Committee Deputy Chief Barry advised that Constables Menna and Gervais have also worked with the DBIA to get this program off the ground. He noted that the DBIA are now in a position to hire an individual whose responsibility will be to connect downtown core people with services.

Chief Callaghan stated that this is a community issue not a policing issue and that working in isolation will not resolve the matter as it needs to be a collective project.

In reply to a question from Vice Chair Councillor McCaw, Chief Callaghan stated the 403% increase was a combination of both local and transient individuals with the majority being non-residents of the City. Chief Callaghan advised that the City has a reputation of providing good social service programs which leads to the influx of individuals from other areas. The Service is also seeing surrounding OPP Detachments bring homeless individuals into Belleville to take advantage of that service.

In reply to a question from Chair Miller, Chief Callaghan advised that he will have a report in regards to the resident and non-resident ratio as it relates to all charges laid prepared for the July Board Meeting.

Mayor Panciuk requested that Chief Callaghan again repeat the percentage increase in calls for service associated with homelessness.

Chief Callaghan advised that from 2019 to 2020 a 403% increase in calls for service has occurred.

Mayor Panciuk inquired as to the policy and procedure Officers use when calls for service are received when individuals refuse assistance through a Provincial service.

Chief Callaghan stated that guidance and assistance is offered to link an individual to a service, however, if they are not interested Officers cannot compel compliance and that is when individuals live in less than desirable situations and in locations that impede the community and business owners in the downtown core.

In response to Mayor Panciuk, Chief Callaghan advised that at the moment there is no mechanism to track individuals who refuse service.

Mayor Panciuk stated that when individuals refuse available services the last call is to the Belleville Police Service which is unfortunate. The unattached individuals who refuse service are putting a strain on the community and the Police. Mayor Panciuk noted that both the Police and community need to work on this issue.

Deputy Chief Barry offered that the Welcoming Streets Program, in being proactive, is crucial and the outreach staff will be in a position to build trusting relationships with individuals and refer them to the proper service.

Mayor Panciuk stated that action needs to be taken now, possibly more stringent requirements for individuals to accept services. Going forward this matter needs to be addressed by the entire community.

Chief Callaghan noted that an Officer is assisting the Hastings Prince Edward Health Unit with COVID quarantining compliance checks and will have a report in this regard at the July Board Meeting.

In reply to a question from Mr. Angus, Chief Callaghan advised that assisting with the compliance checks is within their mandate and because of the challenges being faced by Inspectors a Police presence is warranted.

(h) Three -Year Use of Force Statistics Report (10:42 a.m.)

Mayor Panciuk thanked Chief Callaghan for the informative report. It is understood that the Service takes between 25,000 and 30,000 calls a year and these statistics indicate the number of incidents that involve use of force are very low. Mayor Panciuk stated that this demonstrates the Belleville Police Service's ability to de-escalate situations.

Mayor Panciuk noted that the report also includes race statistics that show no one is being targeted or treated unfairly which should give residents confidence that the Belleville Police Service, when compared to other municipalities, acts in a professional manner when interacting with individuals.

Chief Callaghan thanked Mayor Panciuk for his comments and relayed a recent situation where Officers using their training, de-escalated a situation where an individual in crisis was looking for a "suicide by cop" outcome. Chief Callaghan noted that these delicate issues often do not hit the media and that he is incredibly proud of the three Officers who, by the actions taken, literally saved the life of the individual. The Officers will be recognized at the July Board Meeting.

Chair Miller thanked Mayor Panciuk for putting this matter forward. Chair Miller stated that by grouping Belleville with other municipalities, especially the United States, does not reflect a true picture and echoed Mayor Panciuk's statement of being proud of the Belleville Police Service who continually work in tough situations.

In a follow-up question from Chair Miller, Chief Callaghan stated that Safe Streets Belleville indicated they did not want to meet with the Service to discuss their concerns as they thought the meeting would not be transparent. Chief Callaghan advised that he offered to videotape the meeting and to meet off-site both of which were refused.

Chair Miller stated that it was unfortunate that no one in the community had any questions.

Over the past 16 months the Belleville Police Service has been working diligently with our partners at the Hastings And Prince Edward Public Health Unit on several initiatives to help keep our community safe.

We believe it is important to recognize that the public health safety of our community during this pandemic is priority #1. I would like to thank the Hastings And Prince Edward Public Health Unit for their steadfast support during this very challenging time. I would like to formally recognize Dr. Piotr Oglaza and Mr. Eric Serwotka for their assistance during the Covid-19 Pandemic.

Since April 2020 to present the Belleville Police Service has completed the following with respect to Covid-19 enforcement, warnings and education:

- 20 charges laid
- 51 warnings and or public education

It should be noted that of those charges laid, here is the breakdown:

- 8 of the charges laid were residents of Belleville
- 12 of the charges laid were non-residents of Belleville (most GTA residents)

The Belleville Police Service also assisted with Public Health Unit with 47 compliance checks.
